

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### Trunk or Treat at Mt. Olive Friday October 31, 2025









The approval of our updated Constitution and Bylaws reflects our unity and readiness for the future. These aren't just tasks, but signs of a congregation listening to God and moving forward in faith and hope.

...Seeking Our Next Shepherd

On August 14, the Church Council, the Elders and the Call Committee met with President Michael Gibson from the Pacific SW District. He requested a congregational survey, completing the LCMS questionnaire on the Desired Pastoral Skills, Abilities and Attitudes. The following results were submitted on August 29:

The revision of the MOLC Constitution/Bylaws was approved by the Church Council and the Elders prior to being approved by a majority vote at the Voters' Meeting on July 13, 2025 with a quorum of voters in attendance and voting (38 yes vs. 3 no). The draft of the revision was submitted to the Pacific SW District on July 14.







# The Reformation

In October, we celebrate the Reformation and this article will help us to better understand the Reformation. If we go back to the year 1500, the Roman Catholic Church was very powerful both politically and spiritually in western Europe.

However, there were other political forces at work too: the Holy Roman empire (largely made up of German speaking regions, ruled by princes, Dukes, and electors), the Italian city states, England, as well as the increasingly unified nation states of France and Spain.

The power of the rulers of these areas had increased in the previous century and many were anxious to take the opportunity offered by the Reformation to weaken the power of the papacy and increase their own power in relation to the church of Rome.

For some time the church had been seen as an institution plagued by internal power struggles (at one point in the late 1300s and 1400s, the church was ruled by three Popes simultaneously.) Popes and Cardinals often lived more like kings than spiritual leaders. Popes claimed political as well as spiritual power. They commanded armies, made political alliances, and sometimes even waged war.

Simony and nepotism were rampant. Clearly, if the Pope was concentrating on these worldly issues, there wasn't much time left for him to care for the souls of the faithful. The corruption of the church was well known, and several attempts had been made to reform the church, notably by John Wycliffe and Jan Hus, but none of these efforts successfully challenge the authority of church practice until Martin Luther's actions in the early 1500s.

The greed and scandalous lives of the clergy had created a split between them and the common people. Furthermore, the clergy did not respond adequately to the people's needs because they did not speak the local language or live in their own diocese. The papacy lost much of their prestige.

The invention of the printing press helped both to spread awareness of the church's abuses and coordinate a response. In 1515, the post started a new indulgence campaign to raise money for the rebuilding of Saint Peter's Basilica at church in Rome. This was the last straw for Martin Luther.

On October 31, 1517, he nailed the 95 theses to the door of the Wittenberg chapel in protest. Luther, who was viewed as an enemy of the pope, was excommunicated. Luther never planned to leave the Catholic Church or create a new Religion; He simply wanted to reform the Catholic Church.

Luther had experienced a spiritual crisis. He concluded that no matter how good the church tried to be, no matter how he tried to stay away from sin, he still found himself having sinful thoughts.

He was fearful that no matter how many goods work he did, he could never do enough to earn his place in heaven (remember that according to the Catholic Church doing good works helped one gain entrance to heaven).

This was a profound recognition of the inescapable sinfulness of the human condition. After all, no matter how kind and good one tries to be we all find ourselves having thoughts which are unkind or sometimes worse.



Luther found a way out of this problem when he read Saint Paul, who wrote "the just shall live by faith" Romans 1:17. Luther understood this to mean that those who go to heaven (the just) will get there by Faith alone—not by doing good work.

In other words, God's grace is something freely given to human beings, not something we can earn. For the Catholic church on the other hand human beings need both good work and faith in Christ to go to heaven.



The selling of indulgences was really the part that ignited the reformation to raise money for Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome. The indulgence salesmen were going all over the Roman empire to raise money.

For Catholics at the time, sin was divided into two categories. Mortal sin was enough to send you to hell after death. For lesser sins, you get some years of purifying punishment in purgatory. The indulgence salesman would basically sell a pass that allowed your relatives to leave purgatory and go into heaven.



When the salesman came to Luther's area. He became so enraged that he put the 95 thesis on the church door and this action brought him to the council of worms where he was excommunicated from the Catholic Church.

The reformation was now beyond the point of no return. Lutheranism became the state religion of most of Germany, Scandinavia, and the Baltics after this.
